Tips 'n' Tricks - #1

When there is no hurry to change camera settings if, for example, I am photographing landscapes I will use full manual mode, i.e. aperture, shutter speed and ISO are all set manually.

However if my subjects are, for example, fast moving birds which may be perched one second then flying the next I use Manual mode with Auto ISO on my Canon R5 II. The benefit of this is it allows the camera to automatically adjust ISO to achieve the correct exposure, while you control the aperture and shutter speed.

To set the camera up to do this, firstly go to the Red menu, second tab select ISO speed settings and set ISO Speed - Auto, then set the Auto range to 100-25600 (you can use different settings if you prefer but this is what I use) this allows the camera to automatically adjust ISO.

Different exposures are achieved by changing the exposure compensation. The Canon R5 II has three adjustable dials which can be used to set the shutter speed, aperture and exposure compensation. These dials can be customised by going into the olive green menu, first tab then click on Customise dials/control ring. These settings are obviously for the Canon R5 II but I'm sure the same thing can be achieved with most other camera makes.





